

FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

Deuteronomy 26:4-10 God gave us this land flowing with milk and honey.

Romans 10:8-13 All have the same Lord, rich in mercy toward all who call on God.

Luke 4:1-13 The temptation in the desert.

Throughout their lives, men and women are confronted with decisions that affect the lives of others, with temptations that compromise their systems of belief. The Christian looks to the example of Jesus in the desert who, when confronted with the "good life," chose instead to heed God's word.

- * Communicate your love and respect with your tone of voice and facial expressions.

Diocese of Helena Lenten regulations

Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are the traditional pillars of our Lenten celebration.

- Lent encourages us to place special emphasis on prayer both personal prayer and praying together as God's people.
- The time of Lent offers a heightened awareness of almsgiving works of justice and charity, and tending to those who are in need.
- Fasting and abstinence challenge us to avoid attachments to the "things" of this
 world

All between the ages of 18 and 59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday (March 6, 2019) and Good Friday (April 19, 2019).

All who are 14 and older observe abstinence on Ash Wednesday and each Friday of Lent. All others are encouraged to fast and abstain in ways appropriate to their circumstances.

- Fasting means one full meal each day with the other meals not equaling a full meal. Eating between meals is not allowed, but liquids are allowed.
- Abstinence means that no meat is allowed.
- If health or ability to work would be seriously affected, fast and abstinence do not apply.

Babies In The Womb Are "Pre-Born"... Not Unborn Well chosen words have power.

Consider how the *pro*-abortion advocates marketed and sold their endorsement of abortion. It is not called *pro*-murder. It is called *pro*-choice. They appealed to the current culture's mentality, a mentality that we have been exhibiting since the 1960s. We live in a cafeteria culture. Everyone wants choices. We want to pick and choose our morality. Everyone wants to feel empowered in making their own decisions, right or wrong; moral relativism. Thus, the Madison Avenue advertising gurus cleverly chose *pro*-choice in promoting death, but also in concealing the truth; *pro*-murder. As for images?

Oh, they definitely don't want you to see those, and refuse to show them in any of their promotions or campaigns.

The term "unborn" creates a problem, because it is somewhat vague. It gives the reader or listener an image of someone who is not born and perhaps, never will be. For example, a couple might talk about their future "unborn children" they are planning to have one day but do not exist as of yet. Pre-born, on the other hand, gives an image of someone who is already in existence, and is waiting to be born. It gives a more human and realistic description of the baby developing right here and now. It describes a very real person who is living and breathing in the present – not the future.

Therefore, with the knowledge and scientific understanding that life begins at fertilization, and that we are living human beings in the womb, why don't we *all* use the reference *preborn*? If we support life, and acknowledge that a child deserves our respect, support and protection while waiting comfortably in the womb until the birth process, why not give them the dignity they deserve and refer to them as *preborn*? Let's proclaim life accurately. Because now that we know the truth, referring to them as anything less is not only unkind, it is also uninformed. *Pro-Life Articles*



The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home March 3, 2019 – Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 6:39-45

Recently I was having a routine medical exam that involved an analysis of my blood. Before sharing the results of the test with me, my physician asked me if I wanted to really know the results. I was a bit taken back by her inquiry, so I asked her why she asked me. She smiled and said that some patients seem to prefer good news to truthful news. Especially when it involved themselves and their health.

Her insight into human nature came to my mind in reading today's gospel. Jesus is teaching his followers (us) about honest communication. Full communication, he noted, includes being honest with oneself. He uses that great image of the log and the splinter. We tend to clearly see the tiny splinter in our neighbor's eye but fail to see the giant log (or beam) in our own. Honesty with oneself can be challenging. Especially if we have something we would rather hide.

I have been a teacher for most of my professional life. Early on, I read books that described successful teaching methods. I wanted to learn if there were any tricks to the trade. I learned that there were. The most important truth was this: Love your students and always be honest with them. They will more likely remember you than what you taught.

These can be hard lessons to accept. It's all too easy to deny personal responsibility for our actions. We too easily blame others and the "other" can be as silly as the weather, what we ate, our less-than-perfect ancestors or "the breakes of the game." We often find it difficult to admit to our personal shortcomings. Or to blame ourselves.

Jesus is concerned with our being honest with ourselves because he wants us all to be good communicators of his message. We deliver his message through our words and actions. All of them. Especially his message of kindness, forgiveness and love to all those we meet each day, even to strangers. Our example as caring parents, neighbors and coworkers says so much more about God and us than do our words.

When Pope Saint Paul VI wrote about communicating the gospel message to others in his teaching about evangelization (something we are all supposed to do), he said that the primary way the gospel is communicated is through witnessing. That happens through how we live, more than in what we say. He also noted that evangelization happens in the family where parents evangelize their children, but also, children evangelize their parents.
