

READINGS FOR THE TWENTY EIGHTH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME October 13, 2019:

2 Kings 5:14-17; 2 Timothy 2:8-13; Luke 17:11-19

QUESTION OF THE WEEK "Is Jesus God or is He God's Son?"

He is both. To say Jesus is God means that He is a divine person, the Second Person of the Trinity, and that He possesses the divine nature: He acts as God acts (Jn 1:1, 20:28; Col 1:15 2:9; CCC 240, 242). To say He is the Son of God means that He is the Son of the Father, the First Person of the Trinity, and that He possesses the same divine nature as the Father (MT 3:16-17; Heb 1:1-3; CCC 262).

Perhaps this analogy will help: As a human being, you are the child of human parents, not mere animal parents. You possess a human nature from them. Well, Jesus is the eternal Son of the Father. He existed from all eternity with the Father as the divine Son before assuming a human nature and being born in Bethlehem two thousand years ago. He has existed from all eternity with the Father, eternally proceeding from Him as light streams forth from the sun (Jn 1:1-5). And as you share a common human nature with your parents, so the Son shares the divine nature with God the Father (and the Holy spirit) (Heb 1:3; Col 2:9). In that sense, we can speak of Jesus as the Son of God, because He is God the Son, the Second Person of the Trinity.

There is, however, another sense in which Jesus is the Son of God, Jesus Christ possesses two natures, a human nature and a divine nature (CCC 423, 430). Jesus is also the Son of God in the sense that God alone is the Father of His human nature. The doctrine of the virginal conception and birth holds that Jesus had no earthly father (Mt 1:18-23; Lk 1:26-38).

Another thing to keep in mind is that Jesus is not 50% human and 50% divine. He is 100% human and 100% divine (1 Tm 2:5). This joining of the two natures is called the Hypostatic Union (CCC 252, 464, 370).

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home October 6, 2019 – 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time Luke 17:5-10

You have likely heard the saying, "A little goes a long way." It's been used in commercials to sell medicinal drugs. It's been employed as lyrics in songs. It's been said by parents to children who want more of something or other. In all these instances, the point is that measuring what's being referred to as "little" is not important. In fact, in some situations, accurate measuring may not even be possible – or necessary. Still, we seem bent on measuring.

In today's gospel the disciples of Jesus believed that the quantity of their religious faith was not enough. To face the difficulties of living each day as Jesus taught, they believed that their faith in God, their trust in God, their love of God needed to be stronger. They felt inadequate. For instance, they wondered whether they would be capable of forgiving faults in others. Maybe even failures of their own. They knew Jesus wanted this. Could they do it?

Jesus understood their hesitancy and their concerns. He knew that part of human weakness was the fear of failure. He wanted to assure them that the faith they had been given by God, and accepted by them, was sufficient. They had to be reminded that if anyone is connected with God, even by a thread, that will be enough. It may seem "too small" – like a tiny mustard seed. Yet, Jesus reminded them that "a little goes a long way." In that sense, nothing is too small or insufficient in God's world.

Further, we should admit that exact measurement is not needed when it comes to our relationship with God. God doesn't have "close friends" and more distant ones. We can say that God's love for all of us is huge and that our love for God will always seem to us as much less. That's okay. As already implied, measurement is not appropriate. We all fall short in some way. To use another popular phrase, "Go with what you have. That is enough."

This is important because we live in a world that is overly size-conscious. We are attracted to what is judged the largest, the greatest, the best, the most beautiful. Even what's most expensive. What we need to realize is that God does not operate in that way. God is fully generous to all, helpful to all, deeply in love with all of us. To us, our faith in God might seem inadequate. But to God – and this is what's most important- it isn't. That's partly why Jesus seemed drawn to children, to "the little ones." It's not our size that matters. It's the range and depth of God's love. Trust in that.
