

A STEWARDSHIP MOMENT

The season of Advent is upon us, and in today's Gospel Jesus delivers a simple message through the pen of Saint Mark: "Be watchful! Be alert!" Christian stewards understand what Jesus meant when he said, "It's like a man going away: He leaves his house and puts his servants in charge, each with his assigned task." Good stewards realize that to each one a task is assigned by God. They have been set in a particular place and station in life, and have been gifted with unique relationships. How do we respond to the tasks or cultivate our relationships in a way that keeps us alert for the return of Christ?

Mark 1:1-8

PRACTICE OF HOPE

Isaiah calls us to be comforted and promises that our service and our guilt are over – that we will see together the glory of the Lord. In the Second Reading, we are told of new heavens and a new earth. And in the Gospel, the fruition of these promises is defined when John the Baptist declares that soon, baptized with the Holy Spirit, we will be ushered into a new kind of being. Our hope in the fulfillment of these promises sustains us. Ask yourself how a truly hopeful person lives.

Go for a walk in nature ("go up onto a high mountain"), even if only to a city park, and thank God for the gift of the natural world; let your hope make you joyful in your interactions with others.

Reflect on a situation in which you have cause to feel comfort. Pray the rosary, focusing on the Joyful Mysteries.

Talk to your children, grandchildren, or a godchild about the day they were baptized, and if you remember your Baptism, or have heard stories about it, recount it for them. At Home With the Word 2020

ANDREW, THE APOSTLE, FEAST DAY NOVEMBER 30TH

In the synoptic Gospels, Andrew is a Galilean fisherman grouped with his brother, Peter, and with James and John in the inner circle of Apostles; in John's Gospel, he is the disciple of John the Baptist who is the first to follow Jesus and who brings his brother to the Lord. Many traditions about Andrew come from the apocryphal second-century Acts of Andrew, which depicts him as a zealous missionary in the Black Sea region who is crucified—tied to an x-shaped cross—by the Roman governor. Some early church historians also said he evangelized in Greece and Asia Minor. He is the patron saint of Scotland, Russia, Greece, and those who fish for a living.

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home November 29, 2020 – First Sunday of Advent Mark 13:33-37

At this moment we are back to the same place in the Universe in relationship to the sun that we were a year ago. But much has changed on our planet during its last annual solar circumnavigation. And if we are thoughtful (as most are), a lot has happened to each of us during the last year. Most agree it's been a tumultuous year. Lots of challenges, and lots of sadness especially when we think about the pandemic now still raging. I'm thinking about a year's passage because this Sunday marks the first day of the New Church Year.

The gospel message placed before us is timely and well worth our consideration. It recounts words of Jesus when he said: Be watchful! Be alert! For what, you might ask. Is there something on the horizon that might place us in danger? Some might remember the fears that some had when we entered the New Millennium. But little happened except changing our calendars.

I don't think Jesus is talking about being alert to some new happening, but rather a reminder to sharpen our *internal* life, our awareness, our sense of God's presence in us and all around us. In other words, with God being a part of what's now happening all the time, we need reminders of this because we can easily slip into superficiality or be side-tracked by daily distractions. Or we simply forget.

We believe that God is not just a word or something or someone far away. Rather God is an immediate presence, powerfully creating and sustaining all that exists in creation.

God is not simply a larger version of ourselves. Theologians have described God as "wholly other" meaning that God is different from all that exists in creation. Yet God intentionally caused you and me (and everything else) to exist because God wanted to share life with us and sustain life in us. While this is a Great Mystery, we should not conclude that all this is totally unknowable. It's simply more than our finite minds can know. We know it in pieces and fragments. Occasionally, during brief moments of inspiration and insight. Because these "clues" about God are usually fleeting, we need to be extra watchful and alert. Thus, the words of Jesus to be ready at all times.

As the New Church Year begins, it's a fitting time to recalibrate the way we think about ourselves and the world we inhabit. Start by looking more deeply at those we live with. Where is God in them? Then do the same for yourself. A great New Year's resolution. David M. Thomas, PhD
