The patron saint of widows, Paula was a wealthy Roman widowed with five children at age 32. Another widow introduced her to St. Jerome, a priest and papal secretary to St. Damasus. Jerome became her spiritual director, urging a life of asceticism and charity. When he learned she was fluent in Greek, he enlisted her help in translating Greek biblical texts for his new Latin version of the Bible. Paula had joined the circle of nobility-born Roman women in Jerome's orbit, and followed him to the Holy Land when he left Rome. She taught herself Hebrew, and exhausted her wealth building a monastery, three convents and a hospital in Bethlehem.

PRACTICE OF FAITH

In the history of salvation, God has spoken to his people through a variety of messengers, revealing himself fully in Jesus, the Word Incarnate. Even after Jesus returned to the Father, God continues to speak to us. The Church, Scripture, the traditions, and the practices of Christian communities through the ages – we trust that these authentically convey God's message. Our attentiveness to these and our response through our prayer life and spiritual practices deepen our faith. In the long history of the Church, different spiritualities have flourished as ways of reflecting on and responding to God's message. See if a community near you offers Taize prayer (see below) or if a group in your parish regularly prays the Rosary. Look into the intensely reflective Carmelite way of praying, St. Francis' passionate vision of Creation, or any other of the Church's prayer traditions. Pray for authentic guidance through the Holy Spirit.

WHAT IS TAIZE PRAYER?

Taizé Prayer is a distinctive style of meditative prayer developed by an ecumenical community of monks in rural France. This quiet, moving reflective prayer combines elements of the Church's traditional Liturgy of the Hours with elements of contemplative meditation. A typical Taizé prayer service incorporates periods of silence with meditative readings from Scripture, prayers of praise and intercession, and the frequent repetition of simple, contemporary chants based on the Psalms or other parts of Scripture. Short songs or chants, repeated over and over, create a meditative environment and express basic realities of faith which can be easily grasped by the mind and the heart. The result is to gradually move prayer from the head to the heart.



The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home January 24, 2021 – Third Sunday in Ordinary Time Mark1:14-20

I live in Montana where many of my friends, acquaintances and neighbors love to do two things: hunt and fish. Winters are for hunting. Summers are for fishing. Many homes are decorated with stuffed trophies gained on trips into the wild.

But I grew up in a Midwestern city where very few hunted and fished. My dad was a golfer and hunting and fishing meant hunting for lost golf balls hidden in the weeds or fishing for them submerged in the water. But I digress.

Today's gospel is about four fishermen who fished not for sport but for their livelihood. Theirs was a family operation. A business. Dads taught their sons how to fish. It was serious schooling. Their survival, along with those who bought part of their catch, depended on this rich supply of protein and nourishment. And it was honorable work, something one could be proud of especially after a good day's catch.

So, one day Jesus walks where the fishing boats are moored and calls to four young fishermen to leave their boats - and their livelihoods - and follow him. He tells them that he will make them "fishers of men," as if that would explain why they should walk away from their profession and hit the open road with him. In a sense this story sounds a little "fishy." (Sorry, couldn't help that reference.)

And it should be. Because there are times when many of us do something unpredictable on the spur of the moment. Or we act out of character. And sometimes those acts are very good, even extraordinarily so. The lives of saints (both those officially recognized and those unknown) often include spontaneous acts of goodness, even those involving heroic virtue. We also know of first responders who risk their lives to save others. Many incredible acts of generosity might be judged as foolish but end up being life-saving acts.

The gospels are filled with dramatic acts of virtue, especially those done by Jesus himself. After all, in the end, he gave his life for us. So let's take this account of those fellows who set aside their precious nets and whole lives up to that time and took a different path. And think about times when we did something good that others might have negatively judged, but we knew that sometimes you simply have to be a little crazy for God.
