

PRACTICE OF CHARITY

Holy Week begins with the long story of the arrest, torture, and death of Jesus. Before Jesus suffers, a woman anoints him with costly oil. Though some of his followers were "infuriated" with the woman for being wasteful, Jesus defends her loving action, saying, "She has done what she could." He knows that he will soon die as a criminal, in which case his body cannot receive the traditional burial anointing. He sees beyond their limited view.

Do you do what you can to bless and tend those around you? Charity is often blocked for practical reasons that have no bearing on what is required of followers of Christ.

Ask yourself if you have failed in charity because of a perspective focused on practicalities.

Reflect on whether you are generous or judgmental in how you view the actions of others. Spend some quiet time today in prayerful preparation for Holy Week.

As a young man, Basil began living as a hermit near Constantinople, now Istanbul, Turkey. Courtiers of the Byzantine emperor, alarmed at his appearance and fearful of his influence, had him arrested and questioned as a spy. Basil would say only that he was a pilgrim and stranger on earth, but he denounced their immoral lifestyles. According to his hagiography, (the writing of the lives of saints), he survived their cruel tortures and being thrown to a lion unharmed, and was saved from an official drowning by two dolphins. These miracles won him freedom. Thereafter, many of the faithful came to his hermitage for healing, prophecies and instruction. Basil reportedly lived to the age of 110. 

A BIBLE STUDY ON THE ANNUNCIATION



The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home March 21, 2021 – Fifth Sunday of Lent John 11:1-45

We have no record of what Lazarus was thinking when he walked out of the tomb where his body was stored for four days. All we have are the complaints of his sisters, Martha and Mary, which they voiced to Jesus. Their general point was why didn't Jesus come earlier and cure their brother before he died.

Theirs was a concern for timing and reflects our human desire to control the events of the day, a need that all of us have at one time or another. We have no difficulty siding with the two sisters. If we have a desire for one thing or another to happen, we commonly want it done sooner rather than later. And at a time when we want it to happen.

I spent close to a decade of my life in seminary life, preparing for eventual ordination to the Catholic priesthood. Without boring you with the details, it was eventually decided jointly by my religious community and myself that I head in another direction, which I did. Yet I began to ask myself, why didn't God inform me about all this a few years earlier. Like the two sisters of Lazarus, I questioned God's timing. I didn't so much question God's new call to me, just the timing of it.

Jesus' response to them (and to me) is the same: this was the way that God wanted to accomplish something, and this was God's schedule for doing it. We humans are not in full control of our lives. God is, and God has reasons (the best of reasons) in playing a major role in our personal lives. Of course, determining what's God's intent is far from easy. We all struggle with this. I did as I walked out the door of the seminary. Lazarus's sisters did when he (finally) came forth from the tomb.

Today's gospel even suggests that the question of God's intent and timing is not a simple matter. When Jesus first heard about the death of his friend, we are given some of the most poignant words of the gospels: "And Jesus wept." Yes, that was a reference to his deep human love for his friend, Lazarus. And his own struggle with the deep issues (life and death issues) that we all face.

Our best prayer in this matter is found in the Lord's Prayer: "Thy will be done." I am also reminded of a prayer sometimes attributed to St. Ignatius Loyola. "Act as if everything depended on you. Pray as if it all depended on God." Life is filled with mysteries. God's use of time in each of our lives is one of them.

PALMS VERSUS PASSION

Each year at around this time, as Lent draws to a close, and Easter nears, Catholics everywhere look at their parish bulletins, missalettes, and publications, and wonder why the last Sunday in Lent is called "Passion Sunday" and not "Palm Sunday." The formal designation changed in 1970; still, many people are much more accustomed to calling it "Palm Sunday."

The palms, of course, are a commemoration of the ancient custom of covering the path of an honored person as he passed by. In many parts of the Near East, this was among the highest honors, often reserved for royalty. All four of the Gospels speak of Jesus receiving this honor as he entered triumphantly into Jerusalem, days before his execution. In Matthew, Mark, and Luke, the crowds are said to have laid their cloaks in the street, as well as cut rushed. Only John's Gospel specifically mentions palm fronds.

It's the custom in Catholic churches to give people palms that are blessed at the beginning of the liturgy and carried in procession at the start of the mass. It is many people's private custom to weave these palms into crosses or other shapes during the liturgy. I would like to believe that they're not doing this during my homily, but experience tells me they are.

Ultimately, the celebration of this day isn't about the palms, any more than the celebration of Christmas is about decorated evergreen trees. As the prayers and scripture readings make clear, the liturgy is really about Christ's passion—his willingness to suffer for our salvation and the forgiveness of our sins. By the end of the reading of the passion narrative, the palms seem sad and ironic, as the crowds who welcomed Jesus into Jerusalem would be transformed into the crowd shouting "Crucify him!" during his trial. Human fickleness and frailty are contrasted with Jesus' integrity and courage.

So, it makes sense to call it "Passion Sunday." Still, old customs and old terminology don't change easily.
