READINGS FOR THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD – JANUARY 2, 2022

Isaiah 60: 1-6 Ephesians 3:2-3a, 5-6 Matthew 2:1-12

PRACTICE OF HOPE

Global positioning systems (GPS) have transformed the way that many people navigate. In today's Gospel, the Magi use the original GPS – God's star – to lead them to the Christ child. In our spiritual life, we can turn to the Word and Eucharist and a deepening prayer practice for the guidance that we need. Our close friends and family also can lead us through instability.

- ♦ Make a commitment to enhance your prayer life in this New Year so that you feel led by God's Spirit rather than the chaos of the times. Perhaps this is the year that you try another prayer discipline, such as lectio divina (a traditional monastic practice of scriptural reading, meditation and prayer intended to promote communion with God and to increase the knowledge of God's word.)
- ♦Consider becoming involved in one of your parish's liturgical ministries.
- ♦ Explore some small groups at your church that study Scripture or spiritual writers in order to meet others who also want to deepen their prayer life.



The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home December 25^{th,} 2021 - The Nativity of the Lord Luke 2:1-14

The Church offers some options for Christmas Mass readings. I have chosen for our consideration the gospel that most closely resembles the crib set that sits on the mantle of our fireplace. It's the gospel by Luke that mentions the manger with the Christ child, Mary his mother and Joseph his father, with other parts in this divine drama played by angels overhead and shepherds on the ground. It's an account that could amaze us and give us increased hope in our troubled times. If we pay full attention.

This Christmas is my 83rd celebration of the feast that marks the most important day in the entire history of planet Earth. We now know that the exact date of the Nativity is unknown, but selecting a date that more of less coincides with the "the return of the sun – an ancient Roman feast – is quite fitting. The Son of God appears as more sunlight shines over Bethlehem. The birth of Jesus is truly a cosmic event. An occurrence of massive terrestrial significance. Although you might have noticed that first Christmas was quite ordinary. I don't think it was even mentioned in The Bethlehem Times.

And sadly today, I must add that the original meaning of Christmas seems to be less and less a matter of public awareness or interest. I'm not one to be critical of gift-giving, connecting with family and friends or even the office Christmas party, but ...

Certainly, I hope that many keep in mind the reason for this season. Most Christian churches, whatever their denomination, try their best to remind us of the first Christmas. But they are up against what seems to be the full bag of tricks that our consumer culture thrives on. And this secular meaning of Christmas seems to increase with each passing year. But I state this not as a hostile judgment. After all, the world of goods and services provides many with a healthy livelihood and a means to simply survive.

But still it leaves room, I believe, for the authentic meaning to come through. And that's where personal responsibly comes in. And the need for this effort cannot be overstated given the media's massive effort to turn Christmas into a commercial event.

For starters, I suggest we carefully monitor our thoughts, our habits, and our imagination during Christmastime. What are our concerns? Does our personal Christmas thinking include the great event of God becoming one of us? Do we reflect on the ordinary way this happened in Bethlehem? Granted, the externals of Christmas way be confusing and distracting, but there always remains the birth of Jesus. Think about that!

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home December 26th, 2021 - The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph Luke: 41-52

In was during my lifetime that a special feast was created by the Catholic Church for recalling and celebrated the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. It was to be a special day for thinking about family life, theirs and ours, as it participates in our lives with God and as part of the life of the church. I had dedicated my professional career of close to fifty years as a theologian, professor and writer on the life of the family. This seemed quite worthwhile given that most of us would list family life as a major part of our life history. We were born in a family, we live in family settings (which often change) and so many die in the presence of other family members. Just like Jesus did.

But there's a problem which I noticed early in my career as a theologian. Extraordinarily, little was written about the holiness of family life in the almost two thousand years of church life. While there might be many reasons for this, I learned that part of what I saw researching the place and role of family life in church literature. This was the simple fact that many Catholic Church scholars were neither married nor did they live their adult years among other family members. They were monks, nuns, or priests. Many lived alone or in groups dedicated to monastic and/or convent life. I concluded that the lack of thought about family life in church circles was not so much that it was not valued, but for many, it was simply not a part of their adult Christian life.

I also learned something else. Briefly, if something is not part of one's everyday experience, it tends to be idealized. So, when family life (which might include both marriage and parenting) is examined from afar by these theologians, what's presented is, let's say, romanticized.

Yet, an exception to this is certainly today's gospel. It is a favorite of mine. Here's Jesus, on the verge of adolescence, "doing his own thing" while ignoring his parents. After celebrating the Passover in Jerusalem, the parents of Jesus left for their home in Nazareth. They headed home in separate groups, walking for days (!) when Mary and Joseph discovered that Jesus was not with either of them. They returned to Jerusalem, found him in the temple area, and instead of Jesus apologizing for this "misunderstanding," Jesus admonished them! Such behavior would be grounds for "grounding" today!

Well, they worked it out, returned home together and life continued. Although, I would wonder, probably, not the same as it was before. Reality replaced idealism – still it was holy!
