

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home February 5, 2023 – Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time Matthew 5:13-16

I am somewhat uncomfortable in telling others what they should do. Just as I am when others tell me what I should do. Not always of course. If someone needs my help, I will try to help if I can. A little more difficult for me is to ask others for their help when I might need it. Like others, I believe in the philosophy, "Live and let live." Or to put it more prosaically: We should all mind our own business.

But Jesus was not like that. And nor should we be. We are responsible for others. How we do this depends on our social position. For years the social teachings of the church have advocated that we live as sisters and brothers, friends and neighbors, cohabitants of Planet Earth.

Today's' gospel gives us two primary images by which we can live better communal lives with God and with each other. But we must dig beneath their meaning of today to feel the power of these images. If someone asks us to turn on the light and pass the salt, we would not think of these requests as touching major concerns for survival. But in the time of Jesus, they might have been.

First, we are instructed by Jesus that we are the "salt of the earth." It's important to know the primary purpose of salt in the time of Jesus. It was used to preserve food, especially high protein food like meat of fish. Salt also added flavor to daily fare.

Jesus also used the image of light, which was also important for survival. Remember Thomas Edison had not yet created the light bulb. Yet some source of light was important for safety, warmth, and assistance to meet our basic needs. Further, note that Jesus asked us to become "light of the world." That's a reference to the sun, our local star. The very source for the survival of life on Earth.

Thus, Jesus used images related to two important ways that help all live as God intended. In a sense, God is asking our help in accomplishing "the will of God" for everyone. So, Jesus, being the great teacher he was, illustrated these two resources of life in telling us that we are to be like salt and light. You and I are to help others live more fully and survive in healthy ways. We do this mostly in the ordinary circumstances of our lives. It happens in family situations, in our neighborhoods, when we shop, when we travel and when we work for ourselves or others. In other words, all the time.

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home February 12, 2023 – Sixth Sunday in Ordinary Time Matthew 5:17-37

Today's gospel offers a large section of the Sermon on the Mount. It is a collection of the teaching of Jesus related to many of the key parts of Jewish Law in his time. Many volumes have been written attempting to capture the key teachings of Jesus relating to the moral life. They often draw heavily from the Sermon on the Mount.

This Sunday I will focus on two important features of this gospel. First his connecting personal social life with one's acts of divine worship, and second, the emphasis on basic personal attitudes and their role in living a virtuous life.

First, how Jesus describes fitting worship of God. If you intend to bring a gift to the altar of God, and on your way there, you realize that your brother (or close neighbour) has something against you, first, you must turn around, make amends with your brother and then return and offer your gift to God. Oneness with others connects oneness with God.

Another way that the gospels present this same idea is when Jesus said that the command to love one's neighbor is the same commandment as loving God. Or even more to the point, if you say you love God, but don't love your neighbor, you are a liar.

Other religions will make similar points, but none are more clearly stated than in the teaching of Jesus. For instance, at the Last Supper he says: Love one another as I have loved you. At the heart of Christian morality is the love of neighbor.

A second thought is this. You have likely heard the saying: Actions speak louder than words. Jesus would add that words and actions are important, but so too are attitudes. In other words, what's in our hearts is as important as what we do.

So, virtue is not just a matter of good actions, but also includes personal honesty, social respect and a desire for peacefulness among all. This means that not only are harmful actions incompatible with being a good Christian (or simply being a good person), but so are destructive narrow-minded judgments, disrespectful views of others, based on class, color, social position or any way people disrespect the full dignity of others.

We are all God's beloved. So, think and act that you truly accept this truth of our faith.
