


The Story of Death Eternal Rest Episode 1

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home March 5, 2023 – Second Sunday of Lent Matthew 17:1-9

We cannot fully understand the events surrounding Good Friday unless we also think about the resurrection of Jesus on Easter Sunday. And we cannot grasp the full meaning of Easter without recalling the events that preceded it, his passion and death, especially toward the end. They are all part of the same narrative, the full reality of the life of Jesus. And in some ways, our own lives as well.

The suffering a death of Jesus would test the faith of his closest friends and followers. Among them were disciples named Peter, James and John. Perhaps they were among the closest of those who accepted his invitation "to follow him." They might need extra assistance in understanding the full meaning of the mission of Jesus, all its ups and downs..

Each year during Lent the Church places before us an account of a mountain climb that was led by Jesus himself, one made along with three followers close to him. Their trek involved a mountain described in today's gospel as one that was very high. Living among the mountains of western Montana, I can easily visualize that. Mountaintop views are always impressive and memorable.

Each Lent, through the readings selected by our Church, we are reminded of key aspects of our Christian faith. At the end of Lent, we recall the glorious resurrection of Jesus as human. His humanity was transformed. The Jesus who deeply suffered and died a painful death by crucifixion was, in fact, brought back to risen life to live forever.

And this same future was promised to us, after we have lived lives of goodness and love. And lives that will include difficulties, uncertainties and suffering. But we are not required to face life's challenges alone. God's Spirit is with us.

We each (hopefully) have moments in this life when we catch glimpses of what lies ahead. They will be moments when storm clouds clear and we can more easily imagine a future when we will enter a life of eternal joy and happiness. They help us through inevitable hard times. It's all part of God's plan when we were created. So, treasure all of life, especially its moments of joy, however fleeting or small.

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home March 12, 2023 – Third Sunday of Lent John 4:5-22

The woman at the well. That's all that needs be said to many familiar with gospel narratives. It is clearly one of the most interesting and compelling events recorded in the gospels. And this is why I think we are drawn to it. It is so memorable ... and important.

As John's Gospel tells it, this incident in the life of Jesus happened in an unlikely place, Samaria. In the time of Jesus, this area was off-limits to good Jews. Samaritans were thought of as people unfaithful to God. Many had married non-Jews and they did not worship God in the right way nor on the right place. Nevertheless, Jesus visited Samaria and had one of the most important conversations of his life. And to add a further dimension, he spoke with someone who, shall we say, had a quite colorful past.

First worth noting, he spoke with an unaccompanied woman. Not just any woman, but one who had five marriages that had ended, and was currently living with a man outside of marriage. One might think that Jesus would avoid even being seen with such a person. Wrong. She was exactly the kind of person he wanted to befriend and help.

The issue at hand concerned water at the well. Many readers of this gospel might well suspect that this was not only about water to drink, but water to survive. And not only earthly survival, but even survival with God forever. And that would be correct for Jesus came to not only offer us a better way to live here and now, but forever. And he wanted this message to be given not only to Jews, but to everyone. Even to those many Jews at that time considered "outsiders."

And to add an additional dimension to this exceptional narrative, was it not also saying that women were loved by God, but should play an important role in "spreading the word" about Jesus and his message?

This point is not lost on contemporary scholars who carefully study the gospels. They point out that this wonderful woman became one of the first to "preach the gospel" concerning Jesus and the life he came to communicate to all. She would be not only one of the first ones to introduce Jesus, but perhaps the first evangelist! Although we might wonder, why was she not named?
