The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home May 7, 2023 – Fifth Sunday of Easter John 14:1-12

Most religions offer a list of truths to believe in, a set of moral laws to obey and a few practices and rituals to observe. For Catholics, these elements of religion can be summarized in books, like *the Catechism of the Catholic Church* or in the collected *Documents of Vatican II.*

Yet if we carefully read today's gospel, Jesus takes a slightly different approach. Instead of those religious "things" just mentioned, he offers us a deeper, more challenging approach. Just before he died, he said to his closest disciples the following: Look at me. Recall the ways that I related to you. Think about how all that I considered important. Recall how I relate to others, both friends and strangers.

Then he spoke some the most important words that he ever said: I am the way and the truth and the life. He offered himself, his example, his daily life as the foundation for religious living. He was saying that being deeply religious does not mean following directions that might be written in a book, but rather by recalling his personal path, the way he was and lived among us.

The first book I read when I entered seminary life eons ago was *The Imitation of Christ*. It was and remains a classic spiritual book although it was originally written almost 500 years earlier. I read brief passages almost daily and tried to follow its guidance for many years. It was rooted in the wisdom of Jesus as embodied in his example that we find in the four gospels.

In John's gospel today, we recall what's called the last discourse of Jesus, words he said at the Last Supper. Recalling these words today, as Christians have been doing for centuries, makes one thing very clear: the "way" of Jesus is not easy. We might recall Jesus saying on another occasion: Take up your cross daily and follow me. Hours after he gave that last discourse, he carried that cross without complaint or hesitancy. It clearly required all his strength to do so.

If we are serious about imitating the example of Jesus, we can be assured of a life with great challenges and moments requiring our last bit of strength. We will be living amidst a deep paradox where we will find in the same place, our greatest difficulties, and our deepest happiness.

The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home May 14, 2023 – Sixth Sunday of Easter John 14:15-21

All the times his disciples were with Jesus were good. He was so inspiring, so generous with everyone, so loving of life and enthusiastic about the future. One day he told them that he wanted to visit Jerusalem, a place they knew as unlike any other city in their world. And upon their arrival there, they were greeted in an extraordinary way. People stood by the side of the road welcoming them, treating them all like heroes. Of course, they knew that their renown was totally due to Jesus. But they were closely connected with him. They were his and he was theirs. They began to imagine great things happening up ahead.

In one sense, great things did occur, but not in the way they imagined. Soon after their grand entry into Jerusalem, Jesus was arrested by the authorities, jailed, and tortured by the Roman soldiers and then killed in a way that was vicious, humiliating and most painful. His disciples not only fell in deep sadness and fear for themselves, but wondered whether their connection with Jesus was not only destroyed, but their own future was then fully uncertain. They must have felt that they had fallen into the depths of fear and loneliness. Including a wonder over whether they had been misled.

We know what happened next. He reappeared and assured them that all that had happened was not a mistake, a lost cause or for naught. In fact, it was God's great victory over loss, hatred, and even ultimate death. Directly emerging from all that Jesus had experienced was God's offering a new kind of life, a deeper degree of hope and most of all, the promise of an enduring, life-giving relationship with God.

Jesus came to be with us offering us a gift, something he called abundant life. And nowhere is that abundance shown more than in our life of relating with others. First with God, our Creator, and then with our neighbor, those close to us, as family and friends, and then to all others. This relational life does not come without difficulties, but we are never asked to face them without God's assistance, and more importantly, as today's gospel states, never alone. God is always with us, closer to us than, as one theologian put it, closer than we are to ourselves.

Each night I go outside and gaze into the great emptiness of space. Then I combine those moments of awareness with something a little different, namely the thought of God's presence within me and around me. A presence that is as real as my own existence. And reading today's gospel reminds me of that, and lots more to think about.
