HOLY THURSDAY FOOT WASHING AND THE "ELECT"

On Holy Thursday the "**elect**", those who will be baptized at the Easter Vigil, will hear the story of the Last Supper, share in the washing of the feet on Holy Thursday and recall the institution of the Eucharist.

The Lord Jesus washed the feet of His disciples at the Last Supper as a sign of the new commandment that Christians should love one another: "Such as my love has been for you, so must your love be for each other. This is how all will know you for my disciples: by your love for one another." (John 13;34-35).

We will imitate the Lord through the ritual enactment of the new commandment as 12 of the "elect" from Risen Christ and St. Matthew come forward in humble service. Within our two communities this year, we will welcome 40+ "elect" and

"candidates" (those already baptized), and 25 children to our faith families. Please welcome them with grace and hospitality.

REFLECTION: Venerable Archbishop Sheen shares: "The human heart is not shaped like a valentine heart, perfect and regular in contour; it is slightly irregular in shape, as if a small piece of it were missing out of its side. The missing part may very well symbolize a piece that a spear tore out of the universal heart of humanity on the Cross,

but it probably symbolizes something more. It may very well mean that when God created each human heart, he kept a small sample of it in heaven, and sent the rest of it into the world, where it would each day learn the lesson that it could never be really happy, that it could never be really wholly in love, that it could never be really wholehearted until it rested with the Risen Christ in an eternal Easter."

READINGS FOR EASTER SUNDAY OF THE RESURRECTION OF THE LORD APRIL 20, 2025

Acts 10:34a; 37-43 Colossians 3:1-4 John 20:1-9 PRACTICE OF HOPE

For the fifty days of the Easter season, we celebrate our resurrection faith with joy and gladness. During this time, the newly baptized reflect on the Easter mysteries, recall the Easter symbols, and spiritually unpack the joy of the Easter Vigil. All Christians are invited into this process of recall and reflection, called mystagogy.

Keep the fifty days of Easter alive in your home by adorning your prayer space with a white cloth, a new candle, and fresh flowers.

Place the names of the newly baptized from your faith community near your kitchen sink so that you will remember to pray for them daily.

*Bread has long been a symbol of Easter. Prepare Easter bread for your home as well as some to share with your neighbors. Wrap the bread and enclose a note that proclaims your resurrection hope in the risen Christ.

The Nazareth Page A Gospel meditation for your home April 13, 2025 - Palm Sunday ~ Luke 19:28-40

We are entering the most important week of our liturgical year: the holiest of weeks! It is helpful to reflect on the week as a whole. I like to think of it as a drama in three acts. Act one: the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem; act two: the Last Supper; and act three: the death and resurrection of Jesus. To know why this all fits together, we need to reflect on what is the primary message of each act.

Act one: Jesus enters Jerusalem. All through the gospels we witness the growing popularity of Jesus. He began what is called his public life as an unknown, a skilled carpenter from the small hamlet in northern Palestine. Once he was on the road, his message seemed appreciated. As we say, "he went about doing good." He spoke of a loving and forgiving God. He showed God's love by the assistance he gave others in need. He corrected those who appeared to misunderstand him. His love for others was boundless and inclusive of all. His reputation spread throughout the land. Eventually he headed for the center of Jewish life back then, the city of Jerusalem. He intentionally went there. That's an important point. He was not forced. And he likely knew what awaited him. He was greeted as a very important person. Did he come to restore greatness and hope to the people? Many thought so. They placed palm branches before him, a sign of respect.

Act two: The Last Supper. Two features of this remarkable meal are worth our attention. First, Jesus washes the feet of those in attendance, an act usually done by servants of the host. But in this case, Jesus (the host) reverses roles and performs this act of humility and hospitality himself. Typically, the feet of travellers collected the dirt and whatever else was scattered along the road. In other words, washing those feet was messy and unpleasant. But Jesus wanted to do this as an expression of his relationship to those with whom he shared the meal. They complained of course, but he ignored them. He came to serve not to be served. And he invited them to do the same for others, especially if they were of higher social standing. Next, as he broke bread and poured wine, he said that they were fully consuming him, his body and his blood. In other words, his whole self was gift to them. The deepest of unions imaginable. And he also directed them to do the same.

Act three: His suffering and death. No words can adequately describe the depth of meaning for his (seemingly) last moments on Earth. He was arrested, put through a mock trial, experienced complete humiliation and suffered at the hands of soldiers. They nailed him to a cross where he hung in agony for hours before his body succumbed to the brutal torture and breathed its last. And he did all of this for us!!
