#### PRACTICE OF HOPE

Promises, promises – the final words of Jesus are to repeat again the promises he has made us. Perhaps his understanding of our all-too-human nature leads him to think we might need many reminders. But then he gives us a final gift of hope: the Paraclete. It is through the Holy Spirit that the redemptive work of the paschal mystery is open for our participation. The work of the Holy Spirit is why we may hope, without fear or trouble, in God's promise for us.

Read scriptural accounts of hope. (Paul speaks of hope many times, as do the psalms.)

Pray the "Come, Holy Spirit" prayer (<a href="https://www.usccb.org/prayers/prayer-holy-spirit">https://www.usccb.org/prayers/prayer-holy-spirit</a>), and ask the Spirit to renew the face of the earth by restoring hope to the hopeless.

Hope in a time of tribulation is a hallmark of Christian faith: Donate time or money to an organization that supports those who hope for freedom, healing, or justice against great odds.



# The Nazareth Page A gospel meditation for your home May 18, 2025 – Fifth Sunday of Easter John 13:31-35

John's gospel begins with the profound statement: "The word became flesh." That means that in the person of Jesus the reality of God is present in human form. To see and know Jesus is to see and know God. Jesus reveals what God is like to those he lived with and those who came to know him later.

It was this idea that gave birth to the gospels. These inspired accounts of the life of Jesus are not created to provide later generations simply with historical information about a person who lived long ago. Rather, they are written to provide an example (a very important example) of how to best live on earth as God intends.

To live a true Christian life involves discerning God's will for us through learning how Jesus lived, especially how he related to other humans during the actual events of his life. The gospels are filled not only with his words, but also with examples of how he dealt with those he met each day. For instance, we might recall the ways he related to those close to him, his friends and his immediate followers. Or with the strangers he encountered. With the rich and the poor, Jews and non-Jews he was always the same. He respected all and met their needs when appropriate.

Jesus did not create a new set of Ten Commandments. He did not author a new list of guidelines for us to enact. In fact, he left us few details about what we should do. Rather, as today's gospel notes, he gave himself as a *living example* of what God expects of us. All of what he did embodied deep and abiding love and concern. He lived the kind of life God challenges all of us to live.

It was his whole life and his deep love of others that stands as his moral code. Love one another as I have loved you are words in today's gospel. Perhaps some of the most important words in all the gospels. And the most challenging.

So how did Jesus love? Put simply, he loved everyone and did all he could to help everyone in need. He was especially generous with those he met who were suffering or confused or persecuted or needy. It seemed that his love was without boundaries or limits. And this bothered some. For instance, recall the accusation that he ate with and befriended those labelled as sinners and outcasts. But he was not limited by what others thought. His only concern was that he could help. He gave his life for all, right to the end.

#### Pope Leo XIV Elected as the 267th Pope

Giving thanks to Almighty God, Bishop Vetter, and the Diocese of Helena, joins the

faithful around the world in joy and excitement at the selection of Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost as the 266th Successor of Peter, Pope Leo XIV, by the 133 Cardinal electors on Thursday, May 8.

Called forth by the Lord as the Universal Shepherd to the whole People of God, we support him with our prayers and fidelity, entrusting ourselves to his leadership and guidance.

This is also a historic day for U. S. Catholics, who celebrate the first American Pope in the Church's history, giving the faithful of the United States a deeper connection to the heart of the global Church in a new and profound way.

Bishop Vetter was blessed to spend some time most recently with then Cardinal Prevost in September 2023 when Cardinal Prevost was the Prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops, and Bishop Vetter was attending the Formation for New Bishops' Program, "Baby Bishop School," for two weeks.

We are grateful to God for the gift of Pope Leo XIV and pray together for the new Holy Father as he begins his ministry to guide the Church towards the love and hope of Christ Jesus.

#### **Biography of Pope Leo XIV**

Pope Leo was born Robert Francis Prevost on September 14, 1955, in Chicago, Illinois. He holds a bachelor's degree in mathematics from Villanova University in Pennsylvania and joined the Augustinian order in 1977, making his solemn vows in 1981. He holds a degree in theology from the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago and a doctorate from the Pontifical University of St. Thomas Aquinas in Rome.

He joined the Augustinian mission in Peru in 1985 and largely worked in the country until

1999 when he was elected head of the Augustinians' Chicago-based province.

From 2001 to 2013, he served as prior general of the worldwide order in Rome. In 2014, Pope Francis named him bishop of Chiclayo, in northern Peru. He was then named as the apostolic administrator of Callao, Peru from April 2020 to May 2021.

On January 30, 2023, Pope Francis appointed him as prefect of the Dicastery for Bishops and president of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America and proclaimed him a Cardinal later that year on September 30, 2023.

#### ST. JOAN OF ARC

May 30 is the traditional feast day for St. Joan of Arc and marks a time to celebrate the successes and graces of the year just past, to commit our struggles to the tender love and mercy of our God, and to invoke blessing on the summer ahead and year to come. Joan of Arc is the patron saint of France, soldiers, prisoners, people ridiculed for their piety, rape victims, and women in the military. She is also revered as a protector of the French nation and is often associated with courage and faith.

To the end, she continued to claim that the voices she had heard all her life were divine in nature. She called on her three favorite saints for help as she burned. Right before she lost consciousness, she yelled out: "Jesus!"

Joan of Arc's heart did survive the fire at the stake, although her body was burned multiple times. Her heart was initially found intact, and it was even considered a miracle in the 15th century. The executioner, after burning her body twice, was ordered to throw the remaining ashes and debris into the Seine River to prevent her from being worshipped.

Here's a more detailed breakdown:

- Intact Heart: Despite being burned at the stake, Joan of Arc's heart remained intact.
- **Multiple Burnings:** Her body was burned multiple times to ensure complete destruction, but the heart persisted.
- **Discarded Ashes:** The ashes and remaining debris, including the heart, were eventually cast into the Seine River to prevent veneration of her relics.
- Canonization: Joan of Arc was canonized by the Catholic Church in 1920
- Patronage: She is the patron saint of France, soldiers, and captives.
- **Significance:** Her feast day is a time for reflection on her life, her faith, and her legacy as a leader and a symbol of hope.
